COMMUNITY INFORMATION

Pumpkins on the Pier is the kickoff event to launch the 2013 Toys for Tots campaign which provides Christmas presents to less privileged children on the Saanich Peninsula.

Starting on October 19th, toys can be dropped off at the Mary Winspear Centre. For the following week, people who donate a new, unwrapped toy will be given a coupon for a free pumpkin, courtesy of Michell Bros Farms. Participants can pick up a pumpkin, carve it and bring it along to enter in the contest held on October 26th at Beacon Park.

Pumpkins on the Pier will take place from 4 to 7 p.m. on Saturday October 26th and will include contests for pumpkin carving, pumpkin pie eating and apple biting. There will also be an Open Stage for youth musicians to perform. Costumed children will have the opportunity to trick or treat through downtown Sidney, where businesses will be providing candy treats. Finally, the event will conclude with a pumpkin parade from Beacon Park to Bevan Pier. The pumpkins will be placed on hay bales along the pier for display through the week up to Halloween.



WHO SHOULD GET THE SEASONAL INFLUENZA (FLU) VACCINE

The influenza vaccine protects against viruses that cause seasonal influenza, often called the flu. The vaccine does not protect against other viruses or bacteria that cause colds or stomach illness such as "stomach flu."

numerizar, orien called seasonal flu, is an infection of the nose, throat and lungs caused by the influenza virus. A person with influenza is at risk of other infections, including viral or bacterial pneumonia (infections of the lungs). Influenza spreads easily from person to person through coughing, sneezing, or having close face-to-face contact. The virus can also be spread when a person touches an object contaminated with the influenza virus and then touches his or her mouth or nose. Influenza, often called seasonal flu, is an infection of the nose, throat and lungs caused by the

In BC, the following groups are eligible for the free annual vaccination:

- · Children and adults with chronic health conditions and their household contacts
- Healthy children from 6 months of age to less than 5 years of age
- Household contacts and caregivers of children from birth to less than 5 years of age
- Pregnant women at any stage of pregnancy during the influenza seasor People 65 or older and their caregivers
- Residents of nursing homes and other chronic care facilities
- Health care workers
- Emergency responders Owners and operators of poultry farms
- Aboriginal peoples
- People who are very obese (those with a body mass index of 40 or greater) Corrections officers and inmates in provincial correctional institutions
- Those who provide care or service in potential outbreak settings housing high risk persons (e.g. crew on ships)

Influenza vaccine is available through health units, physicians and pharmacists. The vaccine is free for anyone in the above groups.

TRICK OR TEETH!

When it comes to Halloween candy and tooth health, the "all or nothing" approach is best. Giving children their Halloween candy over days or weeks is not the best choice. The risk of tooth decay increases with the amount of sugar and the number of times teeth are exposed to it.

Tooth safe suggestions for enjoying Halloween treats are:

- Serve a healthy dinner (or snack) before trick-or-treating. This will leave less room for sugary snacking. You will know your child has eaten **something** nutritious on this
- sugary shacking, for will know your sime reaction defecting fight.

 Limit the number of times teeth are exposed to sugar by encouraging children to enjoy some candy at one sitting. Then, be sure to brush their teeth afterwards.

 Cut down on the number of sugary treats children receive by handing out "looth-friendly" options like stickers, temporary tattoos, fancy pens and pencils, or toothbrushes!

And of course, remember to floss and brush with fluoride toothpaste before going to bed, or there could be some very <code>scary</code> results!

With Halloween fast approaching, we want to think of ways to keep our children safe while trick or treating. Up to about 9 years of age, children do not have the skills to be safe in traffic. Many children have difficulty judging speed and distance and concentrate for only short periods of time. This will be especially true with the added excitement of Halloween. In addition, there will be many strangers on the street on Halloween night. Here are some tips to help keep your child

- Teach your child road safety rules and to look, listen and think about traffic
- Know where they are Know what they are doing Know who they are with
- Teach your child about personal safety and the danger of talking to strangers. Teach them never to go with or accept anything from someone they do not know.


When children understand how to be safe, parents can be more relaxed about their children being out for Halloween.

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HEAD LICE AWARENESS

Outbreaks of head lice are common throughout the school year. Although head lice are a nuisance, head lice are not a health risk.

Head lice spread quickly by close, head-to-head contact. Lice cannot live on furniture or carpet, and they cannot jump or fly. There may be few or no symptoms, but itching may occur.

You can help by:

- Checking your child's head with the wet-combing method of detection once a week throughout the school year.
 Encouraging your child to wear their hair tied back, and avoid touching heads with other sturients.
- Using the wet-combing method of treatment if you notice lice on your child's head. Telling the classroom teacher if your child has head lice, so other parents can be notified.
